

Foreword

'The Lost Fragrance of Memory,' Suman Dey's first major solo exhibition, marks our longstanding friendship and years of working together; he is one of the artists with who we began our journey as a contemporary art gallery around five years ago in Kolkata with a broad and open outlook. It is a moment of happiness, and we are delighted to present his show of recent paintings at Emami Art.

Suman Dey is known for his large-scale works with compelling abstract forms and rich tonality. I am particularly fond of his unique pictorial style and treatment and admire how, as a self-taught artist, he has succeeded in developing a highly refined and evocative language of abstraction with the help of books and by visiting art exhibitions. Although non-representational, his paintings are not pictures of nothing – the expression we often use to describe abstract art. Instead, seeing how his formal experiments and spatial imagination connect the past – his memory and history are fascinating. I hope that Dey's works will enchant the students and art lovers, who will find them worthy in the context of the contemporary practice of abstract art in India.

The Lost Fragrance of Memory

reveals Suman Dey's unique spatial imagination, a mellowed world of lines, shapes and colours. A self-taught artist and one of the prominent painters in Bengal working in the language of abstraction today, Suman Dey (b.1980) repudiates the use of familiar objects and their material existence, but, unlike the abstract artists striving for the absolute and pure forms, he adheres to the essential reality of things and their substance, enmeshed with the insubstantiality of dreams and memory. The exhibition includes his recent works, particularly the large-scale paintings of compelling visual forms and rich tonality for which he is better known.

Born in Kolkata to a humble family, Suman Dey discontinued formal education early to support his father. He did several odd jobs, working at his father's roadside *Paan Shop*, a local block printing factory and homoeopathic dispensary as an assistant, before entirely devoting himself to painting. Dey studied modern art and artists in books and galleries and taught himself the art language and idioms by combining this with his conversations with the established senior artists. Initially, his paintings based on mythological themes showed his reliance upon the lyrical style of the Bengal School artists. But later, around the mid-2010s, his works show how Dey gradually dispensed with the figurative style, pouring his personal experiences and studies into a highly individualized abstract language.

Around 2019, Suman Dey started his notable *Journey* and *Butterfly* series, stimulated by surrealistic ideas. However, unlike the surrealists, who establish congruity between the phantasmagoria of the unconscious and the object of everyday life, he shows deep attachment to the phenomenal things and the memories and anecdotes associated with them, giving visual existence to many imaginary spaces and tempi. In the works on display, he is not constrained by the limitation of any particular experience. Memory and desire are dissociated from everyday life's immediate, trivialized space; they are uncoupled and then cobbled back together in his long and meticulous art practice. Freed from the need of describing a particular thing, person or idea, the possibilities are endless. In undermining immediacy and the power of the present tense, Suman Dey uses the whole of human experience as his model, swinging between proximity and distance, between the empirical and universal.

Abstract space, it may be argued, cannot be conceived of in the abstract. It certainly has content, but this content is evanescent and can only be grasped through a detached, meditative practice dealing with abstraction. By creating a contradictory space at once homogenous and divided, unified and fragmented, Suman Dey utilizes abstraction as the most effective language to capture memory, not as an entity, but as a trace.



Artist Biography

Suman Dey is a young contemporary artist based in Kolkata. Largely self-taught, he works in the language of abstract art, distilling the visible form into an abstract motif. His work, which usually tells no story, shows his intense contemplation and careful formal exercises. Composition and Form are two recent series of paintings that show his complex handling of the non-representation language of art oscillating between the purity of form and emotions and memories of the world.

Suman Dey has exhibited widely in India. He participated in solo shows at Taj Bengal, Kolkata (2011, 2014); ECA Art Walk, Kolkata (2011) and Chemould Art Gallery, Kolkata (2008). His works have also been shown in many duet and group exhibitions in the Academy of Fine Arts, Kolkata (2009, 2015, 2017); Shilpi Art Gallery (2008); in the Birla Annual Exhibition at Birla Academy of Art & Culture, Kolkata (2018, 2016); in the Annual Exhibition at Academy of Fine Arts, Kolkata (2017), in the All India Exhibition at Emami Art (2016, 2017), in the Annual exhibition organised by the Rajya Charukala Parisad (2016); State Gallery Of Art, Hyderabad (2018), India Habitat Centre, New Delhi (2018, 2022, 2023) and in a Group Exhibition

2020 at Emami Art, Kolkata, among others.

He was awarded the Certificate of Merit for his work in the All Indian Exhibition at Emami Art, 2017. Suman lives and works in Kolkata, India.








Installation view of Form I and II
