Raja Boro is an emerging Indian printmaker with a quiet and contemplative mind. Hailing from the high altitudes of Assam, he is one of the few artists of his generation who are fascinated by the beauty and authenticity of traditional graphic mediums, namely colour woodcut. Instead of breaking rules, he preserves the values of the rich tradition of woodcut, creating landscapes, villages, and forest scenes that reveal his love for nature. His Thoreauvian woodcuts, small in scale and rich in gradation of colour, represent nature as a source of beauty, simplicity, and peace, advocating deep spiritual engagement to grasp truths beyond materialism and social distractions.

Boro's choice of colour woodcut as his primary medium of expression is integral to his larger aesthetic ideals. The process, involving careful planning and the application of multiple colour blocks or layers, requires the artist to be unhurried and contemplative, taking considerable time to follow each step with care. He refrains from using contrasting colours, allowing them to mellow and produce a fine harmony, like long-chord music. Music is an appropriate metaphor for his woodcuts, as they capture the essential mood and transcend the particular natural sights they represent. The low-key, harmonious colour palette, inspired by the mountainous nature he is familiar with, places his work somewhere between Pierre Bonnard and Japanese masters such as Hiroshige.



Raja Boro is inspired by the natural beauty of his surroundings, viewing landscapes as symbols of love, peace, and happiness. *Home* takes inspiration from the artist's memory of growing up in Rangia, Assam – him sitting with his parents in the kitchen area of his childhood home at night, looking up at the stars, counting them, and listening to stories about them from his mother. Boro's works spark a deeper connection to the natural world and inspire a renewed sense of positivity, transformation, and gratitude for life's journey

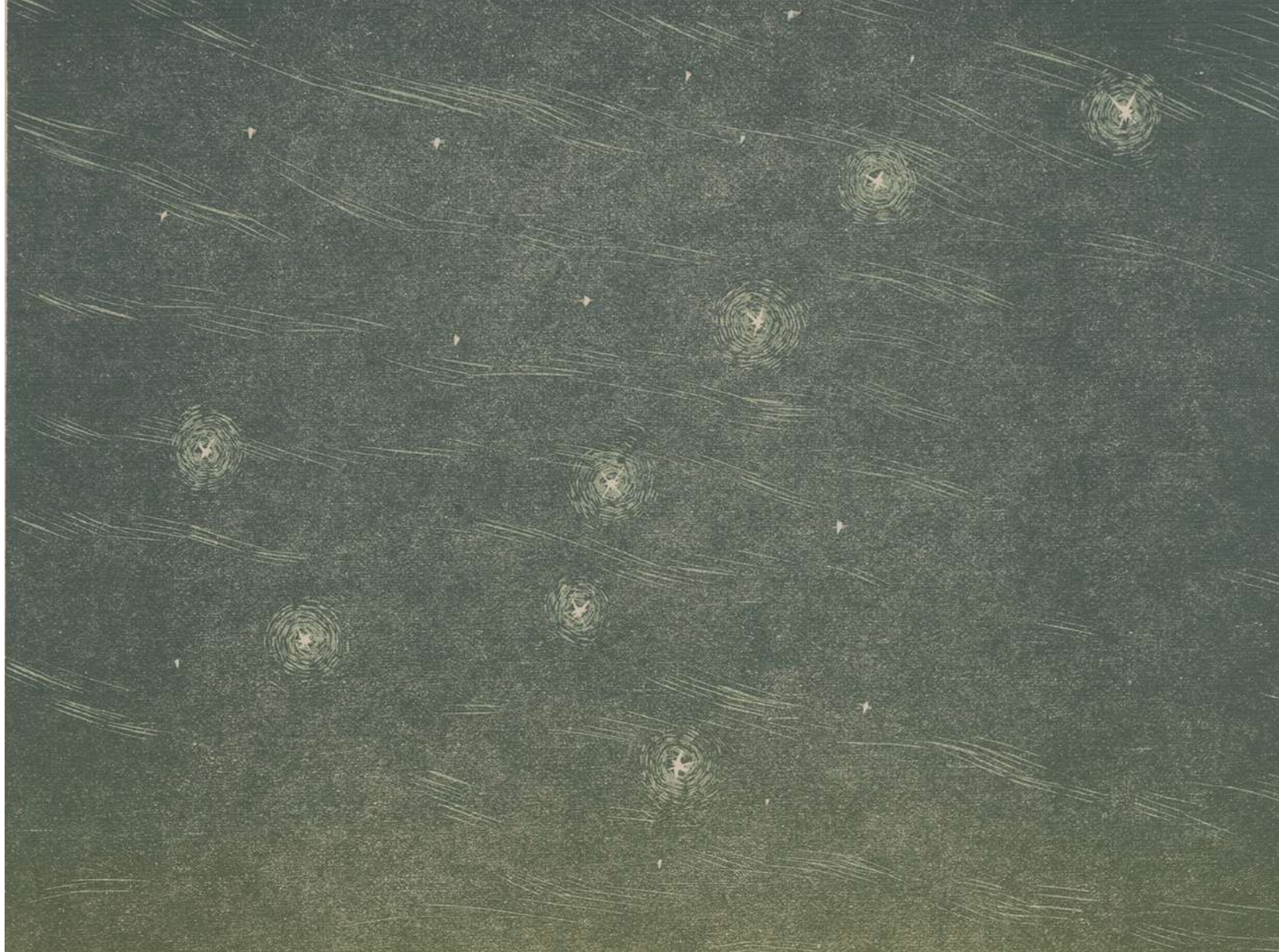

Uttarpally is a printmaker's depiction of a region in Santiniketan. Raja Boro moved from one rural setting – Rangia, Assam, to another – Santiniketan, West Bengal to pursue formal art education at Kala Bhavana, Viswa-Bharati. The changing landscape of Santiniketan with its arid terrain and vast fields has pushed him to recall certain nostalgic memories of his hometown. Boro's woodcut prints explore the multi-block process using local varieties of wood found in and around Santiniketan.

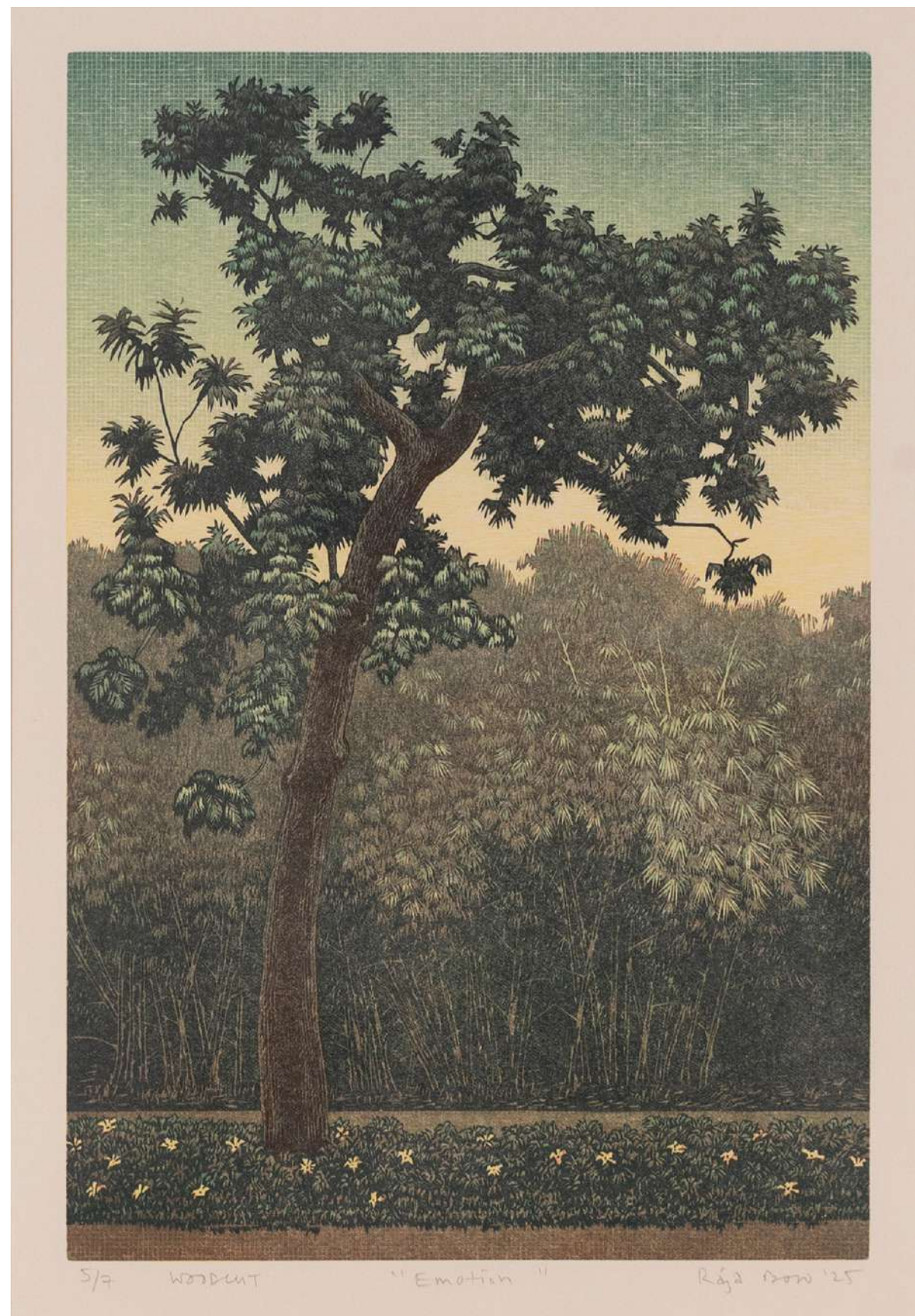

Landscapes, in Raja Boro's works, show up as symbols of love, peace, power, purity, joy, wisdom, and happiness. This work depicts a lone tree with a forested area in the background – a scene evoking a rare sense of peace in both artist and viewer. As a printmaker, Boro begins his process by sketching from memory which gradually transforms into woodcut prints, carefully hand carved in a repetitive meditative practice.

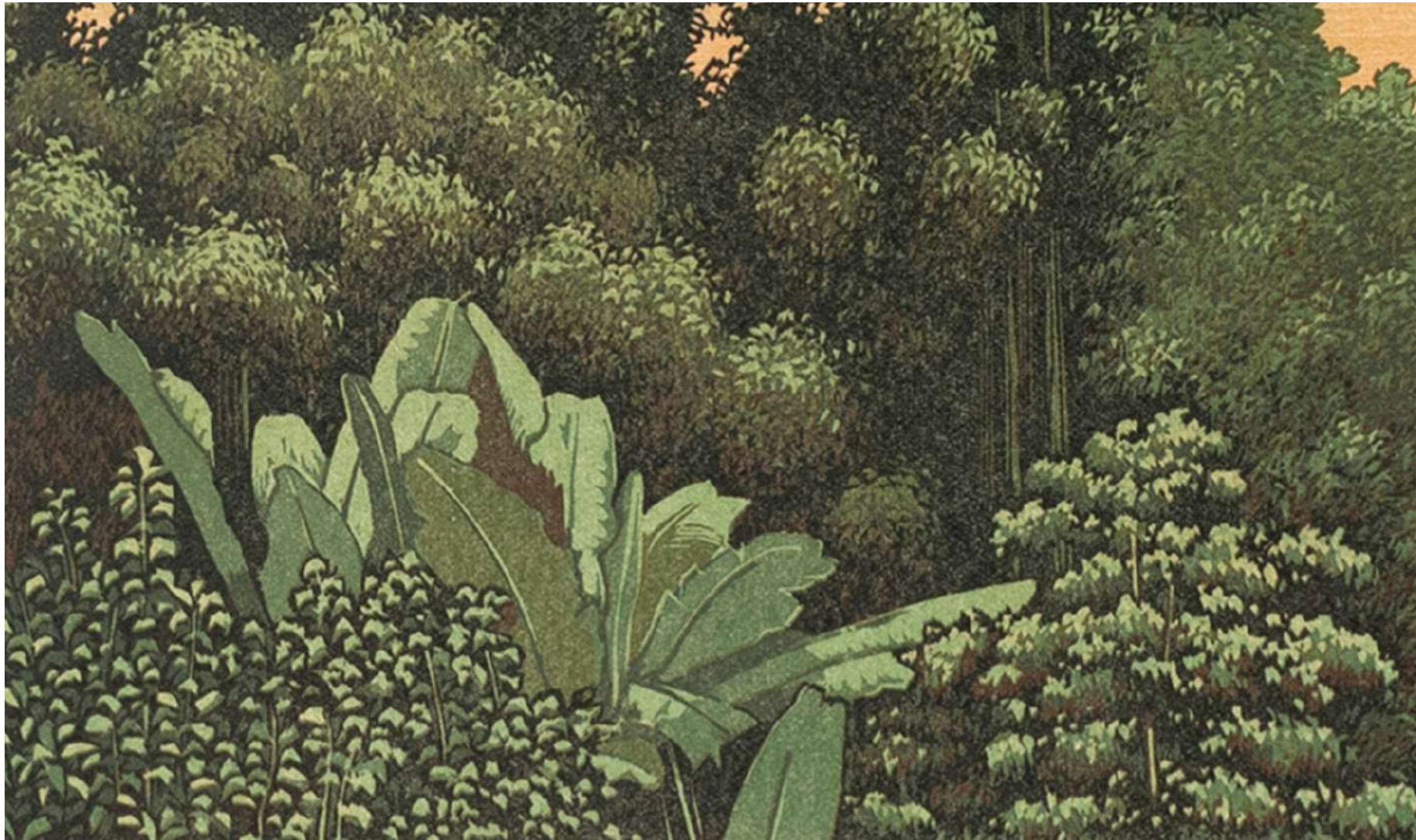

Raja Boro, a printmaker born in Assam in 1994, holds a BFA from Kala Bhavana, Visva-Bharati, Santiniketan (2020) and an MVA from Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda, Vadodara (2022) in Printmaking.

His most recent solo was *Echoes of the Earth: A Woodcut Diary – Exhibition of Woodcut Prints by Raja Boro* presented by India International Centre and Ushaarth Art Foundation and curated by Shruti Lakhanpal Tandon in association with Dhoomimal Gallery and Prayag Shukla at Art Gallery, Kamaladevi Complex, IIC, New Delhi (2026). He has participated in many group exhibitions in India and internationally including *PURVAI: Printmaking in Eastern India - Pedagogy to Practice* curated by Dr Paula Sengupta, Emami Art, Kolkata (2026); *For the Time Being* curated by Nikhil Chopra with HH Art Spaces at Kochi-Muziris Biennale, Kochi (2025-2026); *Original Shadows*, Art Incept, Gurugram (2025); *Editions: Exhibition of Prints*, Nine Fish Art Gallery, Mumbai (2023); *Breaking the Mould*, Anant Art Gallery, Noida (2022); Sille Mail Art Exhibition, Turkey (2020); and the 6th Tokyo International Mini-Print Triennial, Tama Art University, Tokyo (2018). His works have been presented by Emami Art, Kolkata at India Art Fair 2026.

Boro has been an artist in residence at the Winter Residency, Space Studio Baroda (2024); and *Ink and Ecology: Eco Stories for Sustainable Future*, a workshop at Sara Centre, Karnataka (2022). He received the Varshita Young Artist Award 2026, Kalanand Emerging Artists Grant 2022-23, the 31st Ravi Jain Memorial Award 2022, and the Shrishti AIF Grant 2020.

He lives and works in Santiniketan, West Bengal.
